Ms Bronwyn Penrith

Bronwyn is a Wiradjuri woman who has worked all her life for equality and the recognition of Aboriginal people and their rights. She is the Chair of Moreton Consulting's Board of Directors. She is currently on the Board of the Mudgin-gal Aboriginal Women's Corporation near the Block in Redfern and a Director of the Redfern Foundation Ltd. She is also a recent past member of the Redfern/Waterloo Aboriginal Justice Group and the City of Sydney Aboriginal Advisory Committee. Bronwyn delivers mentoring training, cultural awareness and community education workshops. She is also a highly skilled mediator and is a registered Family Dispute Resolution Practitioner with the Australian Government Department of the Attorney General. Additional to her life and work experience, Bronwyn's qualifications include a Diploma in Business: Indigenous Governance from Tranby Aboriginal College and a Certificate IV - Mentoring in Diversity. Bronwyn is a very experienced facilitator and consultant advisor. She enjoys working on projects to help improve communication, planning, consultation and team effectiveness.

Professor Maxwell R Bennett AO

Maxwell Bennett is Professor of Neuroscience and holds the first University Chair at Sydney for 'research recognized internationally to be of exceptional distinction'. His over 400 papers are concerned with synaptic connections between nerve cells in the brain during development and following disease or injury. Professor Bennett has written eight books on the history and philosophy of the brain and mind, including History of The Synapse, Virginia Woolf and Neuropsychiatry, The Idea of Consciousness and with Peter Hacker, Philosophical Foundations of Neuroscience, Neuroscience and Philosophy and History of Cognitive Neuroscience. Amongst the organizations he has initiated to promote the amelioration of brain and mind disabilities are the Federation of Australian Scientific and Technological Societies, The International Society for Autonomic Neuroscience, Brain and Mind Research Asia/Pacific, The Tropical Brain and Mind Research Foundation, The Brain and Mind Research Institute and the Mind & Neuroscience Thompson Institute.

Dr Jamie Berry

Dr Jamie Berry is a Senior Clinical Neuropsychologist and the Director of Advanced Neuropsychological Treatment Services. Jamie is endorsed as a Clinical Neuropsychologist by the Psychology Board of Australia and is a member of the College of Clinical Neuropsychologists (CCN) of the Australian Psychological Society (APS). He is a lecturer on the postgraduate programs at Macquarie University and the University of Technology, Sydney. Jamie has extensive experience conducting neuropsychological assessments for currently or formerly homeless individuals or those at risk of homelessness, through partnerships with St Vincent's Hospital, Mission Australia and the Haymarket Centre. Jamie has also consulted to various other Homelessness services over the past eight years.

Transport to the Mercy Foundation

The Mercy Foundation is located on level one of the Poche Centre, 40 Rocklands Road Wollstonecraft, opposite the Mater Hospital. The Poche Centre is also home to the Melanoma Institute of Australia. The main street entrance is on the corner of Sinclair Street and Rocklands Road.

Limited parking is available in surrounding streets and in the secure paid parking under the building. Entrance to the car park is from Rocklands Road. We advise you to allow extra time for parking.

The Mercy Foundation is a 10 minute walk from Waverton railway station and is within a 15 minute walk from Wollstonecraft and North Sydney stations.
